


THE GOOD NEWS



Now That You've Found Them, What Next?

When you reach out be sure to:

- · Identify yourself as a constituent
- · Be brief and make sure they know what you want them to do. Stick to one issue per message
- · Be courteous and thank them for taking the time to read your correspondence

Remember...

- · What makes you a credible source
- · Just tagging someone in a post is not equal to making connections around the issue
- Social media engagement is important and if you are so inclined it can be one part of your strategy to engage
